





#### Strum Pattern

Below is the typical "Bum Diddy" rhythm that is familiar to all dulcimer players.



It is the same basic pattern that is used in this (and other traditional spirituals or work) songs, but with added **swing**.

Instead of hearing "Bum did-dy, Bum did-dy"

The cadence is closer to "Boom CHICK-a, Boom CHICK-a" with a little longer time spent on the first of the eighth note pair

"Take This Hammer" is a prison, logging, and railroad work song. It is similar to "Nine Pound Hammer", with which it shares verses. Numerous bands and artists have recorded covers of this song, nearly all of them containing verses about the legendary railroad worker, John Henry.
